A Transformation Mindset Romans 12:1-5

From Russell Moore, in Adopted for Life.¹

"When Maria and I first walked into the orphanage, where we were led to the boys that the Russian wards had picked out for us to adopt, we almost vomited in reaction to the stench and the squalor of the place. The boys were in cribs, in the dark, lying in their own waste."

"When...we returned to Russia to pick up our new sons, we found that their transition from orphanage to family was more difficult than we had supposed. We dressed the boys in outfits our parents had bought for them. We nodded our thanks to the orphanage personnel and walked out into the sunlight, to the terror of the two boys.

"They'd never seen the sun, and they'd never felt the wind. They had never heard the sound of a car door slamming or felt like they were being carried along a road at 100 miles an hour. I noticed that they were shaking and reaching back to the orphanage in the distance."

"I whispered to Sergei, now Timothy, 'That place is a pit! If only you knew what's waiting for you—a home with a mommy and a daddy who love you, grandparents and great-grandparents and cousins and playmates and McDonald's Happy Meals!"

"But all they knew was the orphanage. It was squalid, but they had no other reference point. It was home."

"We knew the boys had acclimated to our home, that they trusted us, when they stopped hiding food in their high chairs. They knew there would be another meal coming, and they wouldn't have to fight for the scraps. This was the new normal. They are now thoroughly Americanized, perhaps too much so, able to recognize the sound of a microwave ding from forty yards away.

"I still remember, though, those little hands reaching for the orphanage. And I see myself there...."

Ten revelations manifested in Paul's command to "be transformed" in Romans 12:2.

- #1 Evidently, you are not perfect yet.
- #2 It is you who needs to change.
- #3 Transformation is truly possible.
- #4 Transformation is your calling in every stage of life.
- #5 This transformation is a process, not a one-time event.
- #6 Transformation is God's job, but it's your choice.
- #7 The transformation God wants to do in you is radical.
- #8 This transformation is required, not optional.
- #9 This transformation has the goal of Christlikeness.
- #10 God has given you all you need in Christ to be transformed.

...one more revelation... "you (plural) be transformed"

The command to "be transformed" is addressed to the whole assembled church, indicating to us that this transformation is something Christians do together in the context of the local church.

Required: a Transformation Mindset

Romans 12:2: "be transformed by the renewing of your mind...."

But what is this new way of thinking?

Romans 12:3 (literal). "For through the grace given to me I say to everyone among you not to THINK more highly of himself than he ought to THINK; but to THINK so as to have SANE THINKING, as God has allotted to each a measure of faith."

6 Ways

...we must think if we wish to experience transformation into Christlikeness

	must think like gospel-motivated, fully surrendered of od.
A.	Romans 12:1. "Therefore I urge you, brethren, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies a living and holy sacrifice, acceptable to God, which is your spiritual [Gr. logikos] service of worship."
В.	"living sacrifice." Transformation happens when we are on the altar, having surrendered ourselves to God as a sacrifice, ready to die to our life as it now is, and ready to find true life on the other side of the dying.
C.	The root problem behind our lack of transformation is this: we want to be in <u>charge</u> more than we want to be <u>changed</u> .
D.	Genuine transformation happens when we surrender ourselves to God and make our lives an offering of sacrificial worship to Him – with Him at the center, with Him on the throne.
E.	Romans 12:1. "Therefore I urge you [plural], brethren [plural], by the mercies of God, to present your bodies [plural] a living and holy sacrifice [singular]." ² Paul's move from the plural to the singular indicates that, if Paul were speaking to a church of 500 people, he would not be calling for 500 individual sacrifices to God; he

C.	Paul's language here means that God has <i>intentionally</i> withheld some of the full package from you, <i>intentionally</i> leaving you with deficits that must be supplied by the provision He has given to others in the church.

- <u>J.I. Packer</u>. "Do I, as a Christian, understand myself? Do I know my own real identity? My own real destiny? *I am a child of God. God is my Father; heaven is my home; every day is one day nearer. My Savior is my brother; every Christian is my brother too.* Say it over and over to yourself first thing in the morning, last thing at night, as you wait for the bus, any time when your mind is free, and ask that you may be enabled to live as one who knows it all utterly and completely true. For this is the Christian's secret…of a God-honoring life. May this secret be fully yours, and fully mine."
